Dear Mr. Blumenfeld:

Thank you for meeting with us on March 3 to discuss issues related to EPA's Advanced Notice of Public Rulemaking (ANPR) on the upcoming BART determinations for the Four Corners Power Plant and Navajo Generating Station. These two coal-fired power plants are among our nation's largest sources of nitrogen oxide pollution, which harms our health and impairs visibility within the spectacular national parks throughout our region. We look forward to working with Region 9 in resolving these issues.

We are committed to achieving the strongest level of pollution control possible from these two facilities in a timely manner. The Clean Air Act requires that significant emission reductions at these plants be accomplished within five years. As part of this process, we urge you to evaluate opportunities to transition to renewable energy sources. Despite decades of mining and burning coal in this region, many people still lack essentials such as water and electricity and they live in a polluted environment. We believe that there are healthier and more economically beneficial alternatives.

We appreciate your recognition that this region is one of our nation's most egregious examples of environmental injustice. We applaud your promise to "think outside the box" and are encouraged by your commitment to reach out to other federal agencies in finding solutions to eliminate pollution from Four Corners Power Plant and Navajo Generating Station. To that end, we support engaging the U.S. Department of Interior and Department of Energy in developing clean energy alternatives, providing economic assistance to the tribes for renewable energy development, and helping to reverse the harm caused by these two coal-fired power plants to the region's air, water, land, and people.

In the coming months, we intend to supplement our previous ANPR comments by providing you with a plan to resolve the human and environmental threats posed by Four Corners Power Plant and Navajo Generating Station. We intend to suggest principles for guiding the transition away from polluting energy practices, identify opportunities to promote clean energy alternatives, and seek unifying positions with tribal governments.

Our region is rich with economically sound opportunities and creative collaborations for transforming its energy future. For example, the Navajo Nation has recently taken important steps toward an economy based on clean and sustainable energy through the Nation's Renewable Energy Task Force and Green Economy Commission, and it will soon be the majority owner of the tribe's first utility-scale wind project. Grassroots

communities have initiated efforts toward renewable energy in preparing *Renewable Energy and Economic Alternatives for the Navajo Nation.* The Hopi Tribe is also pursuing clean energy prospects and sustainable economic growth through village leaders and its Energy Utility Office.

We proudly stand united with you in courageously proclaiming "there are no jobs on a dead planet." Our coalition of citizens and environmental organizations is greatly encouraged by our meeting. We have confidence that EPA will provide the leadership needed to ensure that pollution from these coal plants will no longer harm the people and treasured landscapes of our region.

Please extend our sincere gratitude to Debbie Jordan and to everyone who assisted in making possible our gathering in San Francisco. We are committed to working positively with your agency and other key partners throughout the process and look forward to helping plan your visit to the region, including the Navajo and Four Corners power plants and Black Mesa.
